Several properties are currently for sale in our community. Real Estate agents like to display their signs prominently for obvious reasons. However, the guidelines and the covenants provide specific instructions for the display of Real Estate signs. Basically signs can't be placed on H.O.A. property without ACC approval and in the townhome section signs can only be placed between the sidewalk and the townhome for an appropriate length of time. Lately several signs have appeared on common property; a violation of the covenants. Realtors need to be aware of these restrictions and place their signs appropriately. When listing your property, please inform your Realtor about the correct placement of for-sale signage.



Arapahoe County Sheriff's Updates

Stopping Mail Theft and Fraud

Every day, the U.S. Postal Service delivers about 700 million pieces of mail to U.S. households and businesses. Around the country and in Arapahoe County, some of that mail never makes it into the hands of the intended recipient. Cases of mail theft and mail fraud are on the rise in areas of Arapahoe County. In some cases, people are stealing mail and packages from mailboxes, sometimes immediately after the postal worker drives away. Checks can then be cashed by the criminal or the victim's personal information could be used and their identity stolen. Both the USPS and Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office work hard to protect your mail, but there are steps you can take to ensure your mail and identity stay secure.

If you are going out of town, it's a good idea to either contact your local Post Office and place your mail on hold, or have a trusted neighbor or friend pick up your mail and any packages that may be delivered. Most importantly, if you believe you are a victim of mail theft or fraud, contact your local Postal Inspector and law enforcement agency.

DO

- Take outgoing mail to the Post Office
- Pick up mail right after delivery
- Notify Post Office of address changes
- Place hold on mail when going out of town
- Report suspected theft to law enforcement and Post Office

DON'T

- Leave mail overnight
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- Give out personal information by mail
- Delay if you think your mail has been stolen



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

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

Centennial Top 5 Most Customer-Friendly Cities

Changes in Snow Removal

Results from the 2016 Citizen Survey show respondents identified "increased snow plowing" and "sidewalk snow removal" as important priorities for Centennial. In time for this upcoming snow season, City Council has approved the purchase of 5 additional snow plows. With the addition of these plows, major and minor arterials (all City streets but not residential) will be plowed simultaneously. If more than 6" of snow falls during one storm event, plowing of residential streets will be authorized.

Coyotes in Centennial

Recently there have been a number of coyote sightings and in some instances, coyotes have attacked pets and approached people. Please always report a coyote encounter or incident by contacting Centennial Animal Services at 303-325-8070. If you have an emergency regarding this matter, call 911.

If you live near or adjacent to a park, trail, golf course, or natural area:

- Teach our children about the presence of urban wildlife, to never approach wild animals and to never feed wildlife.
- Pet Owners: Always supervise your pet outside, especially at dawn and dusk. If you must leave your dog outside, secure them in a fully enclosed kennel that is securely attached to the house. Keep your dog on a short (6-foot) leash when out for a walk and never allow them to interact or play with wildlife.
- Remove things that attract wildlife from your yard such as pet food, water sources, fruit from trees, and fallen debris from bird feeders.

If you are approached by a coyote:

- Do not run or turn your back.
- Be as big as possible; use arm gestures to exaggerate your size.
- In a loud, forceful voice, command the coyote to go away.
- If the coyote does not leave the area, back away slowly while still facing the coyote.
- Pick up any small pets or children that are with you.
- Carry hazing tools and other deterrents including small rocks, a loud whistle or an air-horn.

In the event of snowstorm or other cataclysmic event, the HOA will remove the common area trees from common area; the homeowner's private insurance company will pay the damage ensued to private property. Payment errors during the transition are being investigated and rectified.

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Stay Safe This Halloween

Check out these tips to help make the festivities fun and safe for trick-or-treaters and party guests.

S Swords, knives, and other costume accessories should be short, soft, and flexible.

A Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.

F Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.

E Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat.



H Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you. WALK and don't run from house to house.

A Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.

L Look both ways before crossing the street. Use crosswalks wherever possible.

L Lower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses.

O Only walk on sidewalks whenever possible, or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.

W Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.

E Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.

Then there are the 47,004 students who started the traditional 2016-17 year on August 11 – that total includes 18,104 elementary school students, 12,334 middle school students and 16,566 high school students. 
