Provide Input on the Centennial Center Park Master Plan

Going through Tues., July 17, the City of Centennial is seeking feedback for the Centennial Center Park Master Plan. Please take a brief online survey and share your thoughts on what you'd like to see at Centennial Center Park. This Master Plan looks to expand and enhance the existing Centennial Center Park by providing additional amenity zones which may include:

• a passive park with trees and shade structures.

• a riparian area of trees, shrubs and grasses to be used as an enhanced water quality feature.

• a community hub that could include sport courts, rentable shaded picnic areas and restrooms.

• a sledding hill.

* a multi-use court (half-court basketball, tennis, pickle ball, hand ball).

* a mural wall (to be used for bounce-back/practice).

* additional shade and seating areas and a large rentable pavilion with restroom facilities and grilling areas.

* an events lawn.

* additional parking and drop-off area which could provide for additional food truck parking.

* an overlook deck with picnic seating and additional shade.

Last year, the City conducted and participated in numerous outreach events to collect input for the recently adopted Trails and Recreation Master Plan and the City's comprehensive plan, Centennial NEXT (anticipated to be adopted this year). Throughout the community outreach process, the City consistently received feedback about the future of Centennial Center Park. City staff will be attending a variety of community events to gather input from residents.



E-470 BOARD VOTES TO ELIMINATE VEHICLE REGISTRATION FEE (VRF)

The E-470 Board of Directors unanimously voted to remove the Vehicle Registration Fee (VRF) for Colorado motorists living in counties where the fees have been imposed. The vote took place on Thurs., April 12. E-470 staff will now work with the counties to discuss and execute the next steps.


The fees were originally approved by the electorate in Adams, Arapahoe, and Douglas Counties in 1988. At that time the revenues from the \$10 VRF were essential for the construction and operations of E-470. The bonds pledged by the VRF were originally set to be retired in 2026. The Board refinanced these bonds in 2001 and reduced the final maturity with a scheduled payoff on Sept. 1, 2018.

"Arapahoe County residents have financially supported this important corridor for the last 30 years," said Commissioner Bill Holen, who also serves as a member of the E-470 Board. "It's my responsibility to make sure we follow through on our promise to repeal the \$10 fee once the bonds are officially paid off and I'm happy to support this decision."

E-470 is the 75-mph toll road running along the eastern perimeter of the Denver metropolitan area. E-470 is a user-financed roadway, receiving no local, state or federal funds for financing, construction, operations or maintenance. E-470 is a political sub-division of the state governed by the E-470 Public Highway Authority Board composed of 8 local governments including Adams, Arapahoe and Douglas counties, and the municipalities of Aurora, Brighton, Commerce City, Parker and Thornton. E-470 also operates ExpressToll, the all-electronic toll collection system available on E-470, Northwest Parkway, and Colorado's Express Lanes.

Dryer Safety: Prevent Fires, Save Money (This was an article on Nextdoor by Risk Reduction Specialist Einar Jensen, South Metro Fire Rescue)

When was the last time you cleaned the lint screen in your clothes dryer? Cleaning it after every load is the best practice, especially if your clothes shed as much as mine. When was the last time you cleaned the duct work that vents air from your dryer? The lint and dust that collects in that ductwork is flammable. Worse, it collects along a pathway for superheated air. If the heat and fuel combine in the right amount, a fire can result. A duct full of lint also reduces the efficiency of your dryer, which means you spend more money on energy. Save money and prevent fires by cleaning the lint from inside and outside your dryer.

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Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office Reminders

With temperatures on the rise, more children will be outside enjoying the spring weather. This means more bicycles on the roads and even more reason for drivers to be cautious. It's up to all of us—children, parents, and drivers—to put safety first, especially where children play or ride to and from school. According to NHTSA data, from 2004 to 2013, there were 327 school-age children who died in school-transportation-related crashes—9 of those were bicyclists. There were more school-age pedestrians killed between the hours of 7 and 8 a.m. and between 3 and 4 p.m than any other hours of the day.

Children and parents can prepare to ride safely with these tips:

• Wear and buckle a properly fit helmet every ride.

• Wear bright colors and/or use lights or reflective wear to be more visible to motorists.

• Have a good grasp of local traffic safety rules including riding in the same direction as traffic and stopping at all stop signs and signals.

• Choose safe routes to ride, including streets with lower traffic volume and speeds.

• Ride focused and alert—never using electronics or both ear buds while riding.

Phone Account Hijacking

Imagine someone walking into a mobile phone store, claiming to be you, and walking out with two brand new iPhones with your telephone numbers. In this scenario, your phone would stop receiving calls immediately and you'll probably be left with a huge bill, and in some cases these thieves may open other accounts in your name.

It's called phone account hijacking.

Sounds like something in the movies, right? Unfortunately, criminals are doing this every day across the country, and now we're seeing it in Arapahoe County, too. In fact, nationally over the past three years these types of reported identity theft have more than doubled—from 1,038 cases to 2,658.

So how do criminals do this?

Most account hijackings happen without the victims having provided information to fraudsters themselves. There are a number of websites that will identify the carrier associated with any US phone number for free. Some will also identify the name of the subscriber and their city and state for free and will sell the complete address for less than a dollar.

New Fireworks Regulations

Centennial residents may now use and possess certain "permissible fireworks," limited only to those that do not explode, leave the ground or fly through the air.

For example, sparklers, cones, snakes and fountains are now allowed. The decision to allow certain types of

fireworks is consistent with the State of Colorado and Arapahoe County and was made after reviewing feedback received from Centennial citizens and discussions with the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office and Fire Districts. The City also conducted a citizen survey and 69 percent of respondents were in favor of updating the City's current fireworks regulations to allow for the use and possession of "permissible fireworks."

The sale of all forms of fireworks in Centennial continues to be prohibited. The use and possession of all forms of fireworks will continue to be prohibited in parks and open spaces in the City. In the case of a fire ban, fireworks would be included and enforced by the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office, along with local fire and code officials. Remember fireworks can be dangerous. Please be safe and responsible.

Fireworks Safety Tips

Here are a few safety tips to keep in mind when using those limited types of fireworks now permitted in Centennial:

- Never allow young children to play with or ignite fireworks.
- Avoid buying fireworks that are packaged in brown paper because this is often a sign that the fireworks were made for professional displays and that they could pose a danger to consumers.

• Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities. Parents don't realize that young children suffer injuries from sparklers. Sparklers burn at temperatures of about 2,000 degrees - hot enough to melt some metals.

• Never place any part of your body directly over a fireworks device when lighting the fuse. Back up to a safe distance immediately after lighting fireworks.

• Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully.

• Never point or throw fireworks at another person.

• Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap.

• Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly.

• Never carry fireworks in a pocket or shoot them off in metal or glass containers.

• After fireworks complete their burning, douse the spent device with plenty of water from a bucket or base

plenty of water from a bucket or hose before discarding it to prevent a trash fire.

• Make sure fireworks are legal in your area before buying or using them.

Bees that are in a swarm are not very aggressive and should not be dangerous when treated with some respect. Do not spray with pesticides or water. They will generally remain in the swarm for several hours. If they leave, it means they found a new home which is great! Your garden will benefit from these busy, buzzy neighbors!




