### **Letter from the Board**

Hats off to members of the Willow Creek 3 community who attended the August board meeting for making it one of the community's most passionate yet very polite and respectful meetings. The Board would like to thank everyone for their input on the matter of potentially changing the means by which the "Restricted Vehicle Policy" is enforced.

For those who were not in attendance at the Town Hall the brief history of the Board's involvement of the "Restricted Vehicle Policy". Data in the survey conducted this spring indicated a growing need to revisit the "Restricted Vehicle Policy." In the April board meeting, several committees were created to address things voiced in the survey, one of which was the current restricted vehicle policy. In the July meeting the sitting committee brought forward a proposed change to policy for information and comment. That is where we stand today: no decision is made, no vote taken.

Based on the comments on Nextdoor, emails to the board and comments in the Town Hall meeting it is clear that our community is united in protecting our property values, maintaining our covenants and having a say in major decisions.

To that end, and in an effort to provide complete transparency to the community, the Board has elected to seek legal guidance from multiple law firms.



### Sheriff's Deputy Talks About Residential Crime Prevention

Home crime prevention "is like an onion. It has many layers," according to Arapahoe County Deputy Sheriff Scott Sickafoose. Deputy Sickafoose spoke to about 40 Willow Creek residents Thursday evening, August 16, at the Willow Creek 2 Mineral clubhouse. He offered a number of residential crime prevention suggestions and answered questions from the audience.

The meeting was called because of concern by some residents that there has been an increase in crime in the Willow Creek community in recent months. However, the deputy said that Sheriff's Office statistics indicate that after excluding identify theft and credit card fraud, Willow Creek has actually had very few serious crime calls since the beginning of 2018.

Deputy Sickafoose said the LexisNexis link, http://communitycrimemap.com/, is offered on the Sheriff's Office website so that residents can check for crimes reported in their area.

### **IMPORTANT! Crime Prevention Tips**

**Important Crime Prevention Tips Shared at Community Meeting** *Submitted by Esty Atlas* 

Willow Creek is grateful to Deputy Scott Sickafoose from the Arapahoe Sheriff's crime unit who spoke to homeowners recently. A lot of valuable information was shared, and many questions were answered. Among them, what burglars look for:

• Easy access and opportunities to enter a home through hidden areas. Garage doors left open (even if you're cutting the grass in the backyard!)

• Car keys, garage door opener, purses, wallets, money left in an unlocked car

• Larger doggie doors

• Tall bushes, low hanging trees - You should have at least 6 feet of open clearance under trees and bushes trimmed to 3 feet or less.

• Double locks on windows - Here's a good and inexpensive fix: Replace the 1-inch screws in your door frames and hinges with 3-inch screws. This makes it much more difficult (and louder) to kick in a door!

Other Tips:

• Lock your screen door if you keep the front door open and a solicitor knocks. It's actually better for them to know that you are home than to ignore them in case it's someone other than a solicitor.

 Most burglaries happen Monday – Friday during daylight hours when most people are at work!

• When you're out of town: have a neighbor take in your mail, newspaper, put out the trash as you normally would, even if the can is empty. Leave some lights and/or the radio and TV on. Do not leave a house dark.

• Keep jewelry, medicine, and other valuables in a small safe that is bolted down and not in the master bedroom.

• Firearms should be locked up. Buy a small safe that you can keep in a dresser drawer for access.

• A baseball bat behind the front door is another option. Have a plan in case of intruders.

• Video surveillance is great as long as the intruder isn't covered up in a dark hoodie, hat, and glasses.

• Motion detector lights that come on in the front/back of home are a must. Intruders don't want to be seen or heard. Bright, white LED lights are your cheapest form of security so the cops can also see!

• Neighbors helping neighbors. Know when someone is out of town. Be their eyes and ears!

• When to call 911: If you feel unsafe or observe suspicious behavior, call and describe what and where. If you hear noises late at night or see any unusual activity, call 911 immediately. It takes 2-5 minutes from the time a call comes in until police get the information. That's generally long enough for someone to break in, grab a few things and get out, so don't delay. It does no good the next day!

• Take photos of your valuables and include serial numbers. Most burglars want stuff they can easily pawn for quick money.

• Exchange phone numbers and emails with your closest neighbors so that if you are out of town and they notice something, you can be contacted.

• Dog walkers or just walkers: Be observant day and night. If something looks strange, it probably is. Report it.

• Finally, don't post pictures or your

location on social media, FaceBook or even Next Door that you are out of town!

Our police officers have a lot of ground to cover and cannot be patrolling our neighborhoods as frequently as we might like. There simply isn't the funding or quantity of officers. Deputy Sickafoose covers from Parker Road all the way to Sheridan! What we could do is write to the City of Centennial mayor's office, in large numbers, and ask that more funding be allocated to homeowner safety/patrols.

On the upside, for a neighborhood the size of Willow Creek and adjacent areas (nearly 2,000 homes), the number of service calls for various vandalism, theft, etc. is relatively low. However, the simple fact is we live in a desirable neighborhood, so we all need to work together to deter individuals from thinking our homes are easy marks.

### **RTD FasTracks: Southeast Rail Extension**

#### From the Project Manager, Andy Mutz:

The Southeast Rail Extension project continues to make excellent progress toward completion in the first half of 2019. Track, Overhead Catenary System (OCS) installation and systems work, including work on relay houses, signals and conduit, is ongoing throughout the line. Rail is in place connecting the extension of the E, F and R lines from Lincoln Station on the north end to RidgeGate Station on the south, and nearly all overhead wiring has been installed. With most of the civil work complete, the project is entering a new phase where light rail trains can be tested. The process, called integrated testing, evaluates technical and performance requirements for key elements of the line, including measuring track clearances, testing train signals and testing the electrical and communication systems. Part of the integrated testing process includes running a light rail test train on the system. Before we open the line for service, we test all the elements of the rail system to verify that the construction produced a safe and reliable operating rail line. Safety is RTD's number one priority, and we have an excellent safety record that we want to maintain. Whether we are performing construction work or testing rail systems, our safety message is the same please pay attention and drive carefully through the area. RTD offers these safety tips for drivers and pedestrians: Be aware of new traffic signals, signs and gates that are being installed along the corridor, assume that all wires are electrified, and never stop on the tracks.

### **Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office Reminders**

Kids of all ages are heading back to school! That means more school buses on the roads, children walking and biking to school, new teen drivers, and more activity around all of our schools throughout Arapahoe County. That also means it is time to remind yourself and your kids how important it is to get to and from school safely. Please share these important tips put together by the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration.

**RIDING THE SCHOOL BUS** - School buses are the safest way for children to travel to and from school. However, there are dangers when children are boarding and leaving the bus. Over the last decade, nearly two-thirds of school-age pedestrians fatally injured in school transportation-related crashes were struck by school buses or other vehicles when getting on or off a school bus. Teach your child to always play it SAFE:

- Stay five steps away from the curb.
- Always wait for the bus driver to tell you when to board.
- Face forward after finding a seat on the bus.

• Exit the bus when it stops, look left-right-left, and take five steps away from the bus toward the curb.

**WALKING** - Walking to school is great exercise and gets kids ready to face their studies. Children under 10 years old should be accompanied by an adult or someone who will make sure they walk safely. Teach your child to always:

• Use the sidewalk whenever possible, and if there isn't a sidewalk, walk on the edge of the street facing traffic.

- Focus when walking near traffic this is no time for horseplay or texting.
- Use crosswalks whenever they are available to cross the street.
- Look left-right-left before crossing any street.

**BIKING** - Riding a bike can be a fun, quick way to get to school. Be sure to do these simple things to keep your bike ride safe:

- Always wear a properly fitted helmet and securely fasten the chin strap.
- Ride in the same direction as traffic, and follow traffic signs and signals.
- Stay in the bike lane whenever possible.
- Use the sidewalk appropriately and keep an eye out for pedestrians.
- Never use electronics while riding they are distracting.

**DRIVING** - For some teens, back to school also means the new-found freedom of driving.

Research tells us that teens are the largest age group reported as distracted at the time of a fatal crash. Texting is clearly a dangerous distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for 5 seconds on average, and at 55 mph, that is equivalent to driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed. In 2015 alone, 3,477 people were killed, and 391,000 were injured in motor vehicle crashes involving distracted drivers. Keep these things in mind when driving to keep your ride safe:

- Have a safe driver behind the wheel.
- The car shouldn't move until everyone is buckled up.

• Use appropriate car seats and booster seats for younger passengers, and remember: every child under 13 must ride in the back seat—no exceptions.

• Finally, remember that the phone stays down when you're driving!

Start every school year with a conversation about safety, and safety will become a habit for your children.


