# **Letter from the Board**

We are fortunate in Willow Creek III to be able to enjoy great summer-time amenities and community activities. If you are new to the community or simply in need of a refresher, here is some information for you.

#### Pool

With the start of summer, our swimming pool becomes a center of activity. The pool is a 25-meter, six-lane pool, and includes a children's pool for toddlers. It is open Monday through Friday 11 a.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday and Sunday 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. The pool is professionally managed by Perfect Pools and supervised by lifeguards at all times.

Until the end of its competitive season in mid-July, the Willow Creek III Dolphins youth swim team practices at the pool each week-day morning prior to the opening. The Dolphins have three Saturday home meets scheduled this year. Those dates are June 10, June 24 and July 8. The meets begin at 8 a.m. and are generally completed around 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. If you haven't been to one of the meets, take in the fun. #### **Tennis Courts**

Our community also enjoys five tennis courts. And court number five is actually a dual-purpose court, with two basketball hoops in addition to being tennis ready. As part of the court resurfacing scheduled to take place in early June, one of the tennis courts will also be lined for pickleball. Pickleball is an increasingly popular sport. This is the first time we've been able to offer residents this activity as an option.

The courts are accessed with a gate key (not a keycard). In case you want to plan ahead, at the tennis court gate closest to

the clubhouse front door, there is a white mailbox with court reservation information.

Interested in joining a tennis group? The Willow Creek Tennis Club is a volunteer organization that promotes and organizes tennis activities for all ages and abilities encompassing all three Willow Creek home owner associations. 
#### **Social Events**

# **Fireworks** Advisory, **Arapahoe Sheriff**



is important to know where one can celebrate the holiday safely. It is also essential to understand the legal ramifications regarding the use of fireworks. The City of Centennial has adopted ordinance 2004-17 section 10.10.30 that bans the sales, use, and possession of all fireworks within the city limits. Other cities in Colorado have adopted similar ordinances. The maximum fine for possession and/or use of fireworks within Centennial is \$1,000.

In order to avoid accidents and legal consequences, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office recommends that you celebrate the holiday by watching professional fireworks shows. To report fireworks violations, or file a complaint of fireworks usage in your area, call 303-795-4711. For all true emergency situations call 911.

# **Clubhouse Trash Policy**

County moves to appointments for driver's license and ID services

The Arapahoe County Clerk and Recorder's Office will move to appointments only for all driver's licenses, ID cards and driving records beginning June 1. These services will no longer be available on a walk-in basis. Appointments may be scheduled online at www. arapahoegov.com/dmv.

Arapahoe is one of only 2 metro-area counties that offer limited driver's license and ID card services on behalf of the State. The change to appointments will help the County better manage demand for these services, while fulfilling its statutory duty to process motor vehicle titles and registrations for County residents. The appointment system also will reduce wait times for motor vehicle transactions by freeing up more employees during periods when the Clerk's offices are typically busiest.

Appointments will be available Monday - Friday (excl. holidays) at the Clerk & Recorder's Littleton Branch (5334 S. Prince St, Littleton) and Centennial Branch (6954 S. Lima St, Centennial). Available appointments will include:

- Driver's license renewal (includes name, address or gender changes or motorcycle endorsements);
- Colorado ID cards;
- First-time driver's license with proof of completed driving test; and
- Motor vehicle driving records.

A 20-minute timeslot is required for every person who needs a driver's license renewal or ID card. A 5-minute timeslot is required for every driving record. Arapahoe County does not offer written or driving tests, commercial driver's licenses, restricted licenses, reinstatements, hearings, or replacement licenses for drivers under age 21. The County also cannot serve customers with immigration documents. Individuals who need full services, walk-in availability or who hold immigration documents should visit a State driver's license office. The nearest locations are at County Line and Broadway in Littleton, and at Parker Rd and Cottonwood Dr in Parker.

COMMITTEE & OFFICER REPORTS:	<ul> <li>Grounds: Elizabeth Wood of JBK Landscape said aeration of the grounds is completed. Thursdays will be mowing days. The cost for removal of downed tree limbs from the recent storm was \$1,300. Approximately 20 new trees that have been budgeted for planting will be planted in the fall. During the summer JBK will assess the best locations for the new trees and will provide a list of the four or five varieties to be used.</li> <li>Clubhouse: Ryan Heath reported 14 new rentals, six re-rentals. The ACC had approved the request but wanted the board to review the change. The board agreed to allow the change. Fred Kremer said that the swim team would like permission to place swim team signs in front yards for the summer. ## **History of Father's Day**

Sonora Dodd, of Washington, was one of the first people who had the idea of a "Father's Day." She thought of the idea for Father's Day while listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909.

Sonora wanted a special day to honor her father, William Smart. Smart, who was a Civil War veteran, was widowed when his wife died while giving birth to their sixth child. Mr. Smart was left to raise the newborn and his other five children by himself on a rural farm in eastern Washington state.

After Sonora became an adult she realized the selflessness her father had shown in raising his children as a single parent. It was her father that made all the parental sacrifices and was, in the eyes of his daughter, a courageous, selfless, and loving man. Sonora's father was born in June, so she chose to hold the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane, Washington on the 19th of June, 1910.

Even before Dodd, however, the idea of observing a day in honor of fathers was promoted. Dr. Robert Webb conducted what is believed as the first Father's Day service at the Central Church of Fairmont, West Virginia in 1908. It was Dodd's efforts, however, that eventually led to a national observance.

President Calvin Coolidge, in 1924, supported the idea of a national Father's Day. Then in 1966 President Lyndon Johnson signed a presidential proclamation declaring the 3rd Sunday of June as Father's Day.

# **June Garden Tips**

June is the time when it is safe to plant anything in the garden if you haven't already. Although there still may be some afternoon storms (i.e. watch out for hail), the temperatures are consistent enough that vegetables can be safely planted in the ground. Make sure all plants have been "hardened off." This means that plants, especially greenhouse plants, must be gradually exposed to outdoor temperatures. For a climate summary for Castle Rock, Littleton, and Parker, follow this link: http://www.ext.colostate.edu/mg/Gardennotes/742.pdf.

- Give turf a light feeding, as well as provide roses with monthly nutrition. All flowering and fruiting plants should be fed a concentration of higher phosphorus fertilizer. If you wish to avoid chemicals, fish emulsion is an organic option. - Examine plant material (both sides of leaves) and watch for pests, especially aphids (http://planttalk.colostate.edu/topics/insects-diseases/1402-aphids/).

- After flowering shrubs have put on their show it is okay to prune as necessary (www.ext.colostate.edu/mg/Gardennotes/616.pdf).
- Do not remove dying green leaves on spent spring bulbs, as those leaves help feed the bulb for next year (http://planttalk.colostate.edu/topics/annuals-perennials/1010-bulbs-maintaining/).
- To keep more blooms coming, regularly deadhead any annuals or perennials (http://planttalk.colostate.edu/topics/annuals-perennials/1072-deadheading-how-to-and-when-to/).
- Hanging baskets and container plantings need to be watered at least daily, sometimes twice a day in hotter weather (http://extension.colostate.edu/topic-areas/yard-garden/container-gardens-7-238/).
- Bark mulch is a good insulator that helps regulate ground temperature, protects roots, and helps keep moisture from evaporating from the soil. Consider putting down 3 inches or so, keeping all bark away from the crown/stems/trunks of plants, shrubs, and trees. (www.ext.colostate. edu/mg/gardennotes/245.pdf).

Bees that are in a swarm are not very aggressive and should not be dangerous when treated with some respect. Do not spray with pesticides or water. They will generally remain in the swarm for several hours. If they leave, it means they found a new home which is great! Your garden will benefit from these busy, buzzy neighbors!


