#### Painting a single-family home?

Before you paint, be sure to e-mail the paint coordinator at willowcreek3paint@gmail.com. All you need to do is send an e-mail saying you want to paint and you will receive painting instructions. Paint colors for the single-family homes must be chosen from an approved palette of colors. Painting a home an existing color is often not acceptable as the spectrum of colors has changed over the years. The ACC works with paint professionals so that the homes in Willow Creek III are current with the prevailing trends. The ACC believes that this enhances the value of homes in Willow Creek.


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### Willow Creek Women's Club Needs You

#### An Update on the Arapahoe and Yosemite Study

Centennial remains focused on the safety and well-being of everyone in the City. We continue to closely monitor the COVID-19 pandemic and take the appropriate precautions recommended by the Tri-County Health Department and the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE). During this time, the City also continues to work on projects that will help in the City's economic recovery efforts, like the Arapahoe and Yosemite Study, and are resuming public outreach efforts.

This study is an opportunity for the City of Centennial to seek input about short and long -term opportunities to enhance the commercial area on the south side of East Arapahoe Road and South Yosemite Street. The City is in the early stages of considering ways to create cohesive redevelopment within the area which includes all commercial properties south of Arapahoe Road except for the Centennial Vapor/ EyeCare retail center.

As the City moves forward with the Arapahoe and Yosemite Study project, we would like to invite you to share your thoughts with the project team. 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#### **CHOOSE THE RIGHT PAINT FINISH**

It can be intimidating to stand in front of the paint swatches at the paint or hardware store and try to make a decision. Picking a color can be difficult enough—and then you have to choose the finish. Choosing the color is up to you, but here's a simple guide to choosing the correct finish for your project.

**High Gloss:** High gloss paint has the most sheen, and will be the most durable. That durability is best suited for the kitchen, on surfaces like cabinets, door frames, and window trim. It's best to avoid using high gloss on walls, because it will be too reflective..

**Semi-Gloss:** It's not as shiny as high gloss, but it's still great for kitchens and bathrooms, because the sheen protects from drips, splatters, and other moisture.

**Satin:** Satin has a velvet-like look, but is still a durable finish, and works best in high-traffic areas. Be careful when applying, because satin paint will reveal sloppy brush strokes.

**Eggshell and flat:** These finishes have the least amount of sheen, and are the least durable. They're great for hiding imperfections in your walls, but the low durability means they should be avoided if the room is subject to wear and tear from kids or pets. Use these paints in dining rooms, bedrooms, and other low traffic rooms low-traffic rooms.

#### Planning for the 2020-2021 School Year

CCSD Superintendent Dr. Scott Siegfried has shared initial information about planning for the 2020-2021 school year. You can read excerpts from his message below and also visit the website: https://www. cherrycreekschools.org/Page/12356.

"In preparation for next year - my greatest hope would be to have school as normal, but hope is not a strategy and I don't believe that is reality. The truth is, we don't know exactly what the future holds. My job is to lead this district in planning for multiple scenarios in preparation for whatever decision is made.

As I contemplate different approaches, I think first about the health and safety of our 55,000 kids, our 9,000 employees and ultimately the homes they return to every day. The fact is, when 65,000 people come together in close proximity for up to eight hours per day, they share germs and then come home to you. So, given the critical nature of education and the context in which we function, I will take guidance from the governor, the Colorado Department of Education, and the Tri-County Health Department in our planning. Finally, regardless of the approach, we must be prepared to provide a robust, meaningful education where students are accountable for new learning."

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## A Year To Try Xeriscaping?

It might be a dry year in Colorado this year. Even in "wet" times, our boom of population means that water resources are always stretched during the summer months. Perhaps you've decided to re-evaluate your landscape for water-use and install a drought-tolerant xeriscape ("xeri" is from the Greek for "dry"). Here are some things to keep in mind.

Some perennial garden favorites can use as much (or more) water than turfgrass. A wide selection of Colorado-native and adapted plants is available in the nursery trade though, for a low-water, resilient flower or shrub garden. Using native and adapted plants not only saves water but can reduce the need for other garden inputs like soil amendments and fertilizers.

If you are new to gardening in Colorado, be careful not to over-commit. New xeriscapes, like any new garden, require maintenance to keep them weed-free and growing. Start your transformation with an area of manageable size for you and have a maintenance plan (for example, you might choose to check the garden and manage weeds at a set time every day).

*Step One:* Remove existing plants, mulch, and landscape fabric. Be sure that any turf and weeds are completely dead or removed before proceeding.

**Step Two:** Evaluate the soil and amend as needed. Compaction is among the largest challenges for Colorado landscapes to overcome, even for native and adapted plants in a xeriscape. Prevent soil compaction in your new gardens but not walking or driving in them when the soil is wet. If your soil is already compacted, use a spade or spading fork to gently lift the soil to help create air spaces between the soil aggregates. Most drought-tolerant plants will not require soil amendments and perform better in the long term in leaner soils that more closely resemble the region's natural conditions.

*Step Three:* Modify or install irrigation as needed. Be sure to consider the future size of plants and how they might impact irrigation coverage and access to system components for maintenance.

*Step Four: Plants.* Note that even drought-tolerant plants require regular and relatively high amounts of water after transplanting or

seeding until established. Depending on the size of plant you choose to install in your new xeriscape this can range from days to years. In general, the smaller the plant the more quickly it establishes.

**Step Five: Mulch.** Mulching will help mitigate soil compaction and prevent water loss from the soil due to evaporation. Many mulch options are available and appropriate depending on which plants you have chosen and your preferred appearance. Wood chips, pine needles, and other organic mulches have good water-retention capacity and can help mitigate compacted soil. Gravel mulch can be beneficial for many native and drought-tolerant plants since it allows water to drain away from their crowns quickly. Whichever mulch you choose, you do not need to apply weed barrier fabric beneath it—weed fabrics can inhibit water- and air-exchange into the soil and do not actually prevent weed growth.

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


