Letter from the Board

We finally received the third bid to upgrade the tennis courts to post-tension concrete, but it arrived too late for the tennis committee to compare the offers. The final bid from Altitude Athletic Surfaces didn't reach the committee until the day of the August HOA meeting so the groundwork was put on hold. We are hopeful to have a better picture of the proposed new courts at the September 10th HOA meeting.

Here's a quick look at what the tennis committee will be reviewing: Sports Court of the Rockies, Renner Sports Surfaces and Altitude submitted base bids that essentially cover the cost of building two courts. Also included were options for additional courts/amenities. Needless to say the tennis committee has its hands full.

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Our community manager, Sabrina Lopez, has received bids from CoCal and Brightview to handle the paver project but more input is needed from the board — ie, clearing the areas of shrubs/plant material, moving downspout drains — to ensure the companies are bidding on the same items. We're sure that the paver committee will come up with a good solution!

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Quick Updates:

- The Willow Creek III website has about 25 hits a day with most inquiries about swimming at the community pool, tennis court activities and availability, and house painting.
- The clubhouse will continue to be closed for the foreseeable future.
- Our community continues to be a desirable place to live. There were six new single-family/townhome owners in June and one in July!

September 2020 ACC Corner

The ACC has sent numerous notices to homeowners to remove dead trees and to trim trees. If a tree is dead or dying please remove these trees in a timely manner. It certainly is not necessary to wait until a notice from the ACC arrives. Trees that imped the common walkways or encroach on the neighbor's property need to be trimmed. Trees next to walkways are required to have 8 feet of clearance so that they are easily traversed beneath the boughs.

Remember that if you feel an ACC notice is incorrect or would like more time to correct an issue, talk to the ACC. The ACC meets the first Monday of the month in the clubhouse at 7:00 P.M. or send an e-mail to the management company at www.hgmanage.com. For obvious reasons the ACC meetings have been virtual for the last few months. The link to join the meetings is available on the day of the meeting at the website willowcreek3.com. 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CATCHING A LEAK

What you need to know before your scheduled appointment:

Centennial Recognized as Safest City in Colorado

AdvisorSmith announced the City of Centennial as the safest in Colorado with a population of over 100,000. Cities in the study were compared and segmented by population size to find the safest small, midsize, and large cities in the state. Cities with population sizes with up to 10,000 residents were compared and labeled towns. Midsize cities with 10,000 to 100,000 residents and large cities with over 100,000 residents were also compared.

Each city was given a crime score that was determined using the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting Data Set. The crime score weighted violent and property crimes based upon the severity of the crime. The study determined that the safest small, midsize, and large cities in Colorado were Wray, Frederick, and Centennial. Waiting for the Other Shoe to Fall



July home sales in Willow Creek have been moving at a brisk pace along with the rest of the Denver Metro area. Low interest rates along with the pent up demand left over from stay at home orders, have bolstered the market. However experts are wary a second spike in Covid-19 cases in late fall could send the housing market tumbling.

The Story Begins

Willow Creek 1, Willow Creek 2 and Willow Creek 3, were built between 1975 and 1983 by The Writer Corp., founded in 1965 by George Writer Jr. Writer is a native of Denver. Willow West, a separate, non-HOA part of the community, was developed by MJ Brock & Sons.

Winter Green Belt

Willow Creek 3 has 318 single family homes and 197 townhomes, for a total of 515 residences. Willow Creek 1, Willow Creek 2, Willow Creek 3 and Willow West combine for a total of almost 1900 residences.

The Writer Corp. built over 12,000 homes in 35 communities, including Willow Creek, The Knolls, Castle Pines North, The Pond, South Park, North Park, Wildgrass, Meadow Glen, Devils Thumb in Boulder, Harvest in Fort Collins, Cottonwood Creek in Colorado Springs and Writer Square in downtown Denver.

George Writer believed in building communities that included parks, open space and diverse housing types. He was honored as Colorado Builder of the Year in 2000 and Metro Denver Builder of the year in 1980. Writer is a resident of Santa Barbara, California.

Standard Pacific Corp. acquired the Writer Corp. in 2000. Standard Pacific and Ryland Homes merged in 2015 to become CalAtlantic. In February 2018, CalAtlantic merged with Lennar Corporation, making Lennar the largest homebuilder in the U.S. based on revenue.

July 9, 2020 | Via Teleconference Meeting | MINUTES



I. CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL
