- 3. Enhancing Cold Tolerance: Well-hydrated plants are better equipped to withstand freezing temperatures. Water acts as an insulator, helping to moderate soil temperature and protect plant roots from extreme cold.

Practical Tips for Winter Watering in Colorado:

- · Watering Frequency:
 - Water plants deeply before the first hard freeze to ensure they enter winter well-hydrated.
 - Monitor soil moisture throughout the season and water when the soil is dry to a depth of 1-2 inches.
- Choosing the Right Time:
 - Water during the warmer parts of the day to allow time for absorption before freezing temperatures set in.
 - Aim to water at least a day or two before an expected freeze to allow the soil to absorb the moisture.
- Mulching:
 - Apply a layer of mulch around the base of plants to help retain soil moisture, regulate temperature, and protect against rapid evaporation.

Winter Tree & Shrub Watering

- Water trees and shrubs on warm winter days, above 40°F.
- Aim for about 10 gallons of water per inch of trunk diameter, evenly distributed.

Violation fine change - EFFECTIVE January 1, 2024

The way we calculate fines for violations for large maintenance items (painting and fencing) is changing. Fines we are allowed to charge will be assessed over a 3 month period rather than a year for non compliance.

- House/townhouse paint or fence violation, no response after 30 days = \$50 fine
- House/townhouse paint or fence violation, no response additional 30 days = \$150 fine
- House/townhouse paint or fence violation, no response additional 30 days = \$300 fine
- All other violations, no response \$50.

Fines will not accelerate but will continue to be charged at 30 day intervals until the violation is cured. As always, if you receive a violation, please communicate with RowCal so we know you are working on the issue to avoid fines.

In 2024 you have 6 months to paint your house or townhouse. Townhouses require an Architectural Control Committee Request Form be submitted to make sure you have the correct color paint for your row. Single family homes require a Single Family Home Paint Request Form be filled out and sent to the Paint Coordinator to get your colors approved.

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

Willow Creek Pets

Dogs must be leashed when they are out and about in our community. Both the city and our HOA require it. City of Centennial Animal Control patrols Willow Creek and will issue warnings and tickets to offenders. There have been serious incidents in the past where unleashed dogs have injured other

pets and/or caused residents to be concerned for their safety.

Don't forget to clean up after your pet when dog walking. The city of Centennial (municipal code 7-7-320) as well as Willow Creek 3 policies, require that pet owners remove and dispose of pet waste on any property other than that of the owner or keeper. In other words, when you are out and about with your dog, don't leave a mess. City fines start at \$50 and can include a Municipal Court appearance. And if you see someone not following the rules, please let them know. Also, both Willow Creek 3 and the city require that dogs be leashed and under control when out in the community.

Did you know?

- 1. Stormwater carries pet waste and other pollutants directly into waterways.
- 2. Animal waste adds nitrogen to the water. Excess nitrogen depletes the oxygen in water necessary for beneficial underwater grasses, wildlife and fish.
- Animal waste may contain harmful organisms such as Giardia, Salmonella and E. coli that can be transmitted to humans and other animals by ingesting contaminated water.
- 4. Roundworms and hookworms deposited by infected animals can live in the soil for long periods of time and be transmitted to other animals and humans.



Poinsettias

The holidays are over, decorations are being put away, Christmas trees are being recycled into mulch...but what about that poinsettia plant? Should you try to save it for a few months? Maybe keep it alive until next year? Or should it be thrown out with the tree? That choice is one that only you can make, but if you decide to keep it around for a little while longer or even until next year, here are a few tips.

Your poinsettia should remain in a location with plenty of natural light, keeping it away from drafty areas like a front or back door, heat registers, and far enough away from a window so that its leaves do not touch the glass. Poinsettias prefer temperatures between 60 and 70°F, so room temperature is ideal.

Water thoroughly only when the planting mix is dry, allowing for the excess water in the pot to drain. If you see lower leaves drying up and falling off, you may need to water more often. If those leaves are turning yellow and then dropping, you may be watering it too often, or needing to fertilize. Use an all-purpose fertilizer every few weeks for best results. Monitor your plant throughout the year for insects such as whitefly, aphids, and fungus gnats. If you notice a pest, take measures to get it under control promptly—they can get out of hand quickly.

In late March or early April, your plant may be looking a little sad, but have no fear. It's time to start shaping the plant and encouraging new growth by cutting back the original stems to a height of 4 to 6 inches. You might also see new shoots starting to emerge from the base of the plant. If so, you can encourage their growth by cutting back those older stems which will divert more resources to growing these new shoots, too. You should wear gloves during this process because poinsettias exude a white sap that can cause skin irritations or eye injury. Plants can be lightly shaped every few weeks though the summer, whether grown on indoors or outside.

Poinsettias are a short-day photoperiod plant that naturally start to flower when nights become longer than days (around the time of the Fall Equinox).

If you want to go the easy route and rely on the natural light and dark cycles, you will need to locate your plant in a spot that gets plenty of light during the day but no supplemental lighting once the sun goes down.

You can artificially create these long night conditions by covering your plant with a large box or placing it in a dark closet. The next morning a remove the box or place the plant back in the light. Plants need at least 14 hours of complete darkness each night for a couple of months to initiate flowering. Once you start to see the bracts changing color, you can stop covering the plant each night and prepare to enjoy the show!

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
