ACC SPRING WALK 2024 - end of March, first half of April

Your HOA Board and the ACC want to thank all the homeowners that take exceptional care of their properties. It not only keeps your home values high and that of your neighbors, it adds to the beautiful neighborhood we we are all proud to call Willow Creek III.

This is a reminder that the ACC members do a Spring Walk every year, so if you see duos walking with clipboards, taking photos, having discussions in front of your property, this is done EVERY spring and all houses and townhomes are reviewed for any maintenance that needs attention.

In 2023, because of the effects of the Pandemic, a lot of maintenance was delayed in previous years and many violations letters were sent out. But, the majority of homeowners completed their projects and the neighborhood is looking pretty spiffy.

Please remember that any changes to your property (residence or lot) need to be pre approved by the ACC before work starts to make sure your changes are cohesive with the neighborhood. The ACC has 30 days to approve these requests (which can extend that date if we have incomplete requests, have questions or need clarification). We usually approve projects much faster when we have thorough requests.

IF you receive a violation letter, it is STRONGLY worded. The wording was selected by the Colorado Legislature and WC3 cannot change that verbiage. It states you have 30 days to correct the issue (which ALSO means you have 30 days to ACKNOWLEDGE the issue). The best response to a violation letter is to contact RowCal through their online website (when possible) and RESPOND to the violation (getting bids, will complete by X, etc). When you acknowledge the violation, you have time to get the work done and you will not be fined. Violations with no response after 30 days will start receiving fines so please respond to avoid additional violation letters and multiple fines.

If you have a paint violation the rules are based on single family home vs. townhome.

Single Family Home - Details on paint colors and approval procedures are on the WC3 website. You MUST first contact the paint coordinator at willowcreek3paint@gmail.com. The Single Family Home paint request form is available on the website for you to fill out and attach to that initial email so we know what colors you would like approved.

Townhome - Go to the Sherwin Williams store, 7580 Park Meadows Dr, Lone Tree and give them your address. Based on the location of your townhome, they will provide you with the appropriate colors (they have a WC3 townhome binder with our specific formulas programmed into their computer). A complete list of colors is also available on the WC3 website. You must fill out an ACC request to paint your townhouse, stating the colors you will be using so we know you have selected the correct colors for your row. RowCal will approve your request.

All homes/townhomes have 6 months to complete your paint project once you are approved. Partial painting is NOT allowed, you must paint your entire residence and garage, including trim.

Another reminder that the Policies that WC3 follows were updated last year and are available on the WC3 website. If you have not read thru these it is strongly suggested you do so, many policies were updated and new ones added.

The Emerald Ash Borer has been confirmed in **Arapahoe County**

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) was first discovered in 2013 in Boulder County and has since been confirmed all along the front range in Fort Collins, Broomfield, Larimer and Adams County, Erie and Thorton. More recently EAB has been identified and confirmed in a small area within the City of Littleton, close to Littleton High school, and by Chatfield Reservoir.

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is an invasive insect that infests and kills all North American true ash species (Fraxinus spp.) including green and white ash, and their cultivars such as "autumn purple ash," a popular white ash variety in Colorado.

The larval stage of EAB feeds under the bark of trees, cutting off the flow of water and nutrients. Infested trees gradually die over a period of approximately three to five years.

Eventually, all ash trees will need to be treated for EAB with insecticides or the trees will need to be removed.

If you have an Ash tree on your property you will be impacted at some **point.** Many factors play into the decision to remove or treat your ash tree.

Consider the benefits that your ash tree(s) provide to your property:

- Do they shade your house?
- Are they large, healthy trees?
- Do the benefits of treating the ash tree long term outweigh the costs?
- Or should the ash tree be removed and replaced?

Signs that an Ash Tree is infected with the Emerald Ash Borer

Determining an EAB presence is often difficult for the untrained eye. It's always best to have a professional assess the tree.

Advanced stage symptoms include:

- Sparse leaves or branches in the upper part of the tree
- Vertical splits in bark possibly showing S-shaped galleries underneath.
- Increased woodpecker activity
- Miniature leaves at the tips of branches late in the summer

What is Willow Creek III doing to protect ash trees on community property?

Willow Creek III has an estimated 126 ash trees maintained by the association on common property. Chris Tonelli, a certified arborist with Town and Country Trees walked the neighborhood to help determine which trees were good candidates for trunk injections. In 2024 WC3 will treat approximately 30 trees that are in fair to good condition. In 2025 WC3 will treat approximately 30 more trees. This cycle will occur every three years for the life of the trees. The remaining Ash trees will be removed over the next several years once they show signs of being affected by the EAB. The estimated cost of trunk injections is approximately \$300 per tree.



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Financing available!

Criteria for trees receiving trunk injections:

- Overall health: Are the trees in fair to good condition, are they free of disease, insect damage and trunk wounds
- Location: Are there multiple trees in that location, trees in a valuable location, such as along the streetscape
- 3. Canopy: Does the tree have a healthy and full canopy
- Structure: Does the tree have a good overall structure

Through monitoring our neighborhood trees, we hope to preserve the most valuable trees in the neighborhood.

LUCK OF THE IRISH

One of the most frequently visited sites in Ireland is the Blarney Stone. Thousands of tourists a year visit Blarney Castle for a chance to get the "Gift of the Gab" by kissing

the Blarney Stone. Although the exact origin of this custom is unknown, the history of the castle itself is well documented.

Blarney Castle was built in 1446 with walls 18 feet thick in places. The stone itself is situated high up in the battlements of the castle, and is reached by following one of several long, stone spiral staircases up to the top. The stone is believed to be half of the Stone of Scone, which originally be-longed to Scotland, and over which Scottish kings were crowned. Cormac MacCarthy obtained the stone in 1314 from Robert the Bruce, and eventually it was placed in Blarney Castle. Legend has it that an old woman cast a spell on the stone to reward a king who had saved her from drowning. The king kissed the stone and was given the ability to speak sweetly and convincingly, the "Gift of the Gab."

More likely though, the basis for the legend of the Blarney Stone comes from the dealings of Queen Elizabeth I with Ireland's chiefs. Cormac MacCarthy was a diplomatic negotiator, with an ability to delay the queen's requests. Elizabeth proclaimed that MacCarthy was giving her "a lot of Blarney," and thus the legend was born.

Kissing the stone is supposed to bring the kisser the gift of persuasive eloquence. But it comes at a price—the stone is in a difficult to reach place. In order to reach the stone, the kisser must lie on his back and bend backward and downward, holding iron bars for support. But those willing to go to these lengths are truly able to say they have the "luck of the Irish."





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

Violation fine change - EFFECTIVE January 1, 2024

The way we calculate fines for violations for large maintenance items (painting and fencing) is changing. Fines we are allowed to charge will be assessed over a 3 month period rather than a year for non compliance.

- House/townhouse paint or fence violation, no response after 30 days = \$50 fine
- House/townhouse paint or fence violation, no response additional 30 days
 \$150 fine
- House/townhouse paint or fence violation, no response additional 30 days
 \$300 fine
- All other violations, no response \$50.

Fines will not accelerate but will continue to be charged at 30 day intervals until the violation is cured. As always, if you receive a violation, please communicate with RowCal so we know you are working on the issue to avoid fines.

In 2024 you have 6 months to paint your house or townhouse. Townhouses require an Architectural Control Committee Request Form be submitted to make sure you have the correct color paint for your row. Single family homes require a Single Family Home Paint Request Form be filled out and sent to the Paint Coordinator to get your colors approved.

Landscaping Committee presentation - Emerald Ash Borer (EAB)

There are various options ranging from treatment to removing trees, each with pros/cons. The recommendation is to treat the trees once the EAB is within 5mi. of the community, but we don't know if it will be here this year. Treatment the year following infestation can also be effective.

- A neighborhood walk was done to identify high value trees and those that are most suitable for treatment
- It was noted all trees could use trimming as

they haven't been for 40yrs

- The recommendation is to space the treatments out and possibly take advantage of the 'halo' effect where untreated trees benefit from nearby trees being treated
- Success rate is 90-95%
- Some trees are beyond treatment or not feasible and should be removed (9 total)

Board - agrees on the recommendations (30 trees treated - 2024; 30 - 2025; 9 tree removals)

Board agreed for the Landscape committee to seek a grant to return the small open area (shown in presentation) back to natural grass, turn off water

Social Committee -

- Reviewed survey results from Dec. (3 more responses since then which are not included)
- Board draft calendar looks great

Pool Committee

- The Baby pool resurfacing project turned out nicely
- A rain gutter drainage issue was noted coming from the club house



Gardens in Miniature

Have you ever found yourself captivated by a scene, lost in thought—traveling miles in the mind? A miniature garden can provide an unexplored avenue for armchair travel.



Bonsai: Perhaps the most recognizable form of miniature garden is the bonsai, or tabletop tree. A Japanese term for "planted in a container," Bonsai or bonsai involves dwarfing a tree or shrub by pruning of stems and roots and growing in a small container while carefully controlling water and fertilizer. Training a tree from

scratch can take years and specially honed skills, but the payoff is worth it. From a single specimen to a tiny forest, a well-crafted bonsai will transport you to windy cliffs, craggy mountains, and mysterious forests. To produce a realistic impression of an aged tree or ancient forest, plants used for bonsai are carefully pruned and trained, and are usually chosen for their small leaves. The easiest bonsai to care for are tropical plants, since they do not require a cold dormant period like trees from temperate regions. If you're ready to give bonsai a try, consider joining the Rocky Mountain Bonsai Society (https://www.rmbonsai.org/) to meet others interested in perfecting the art.

Terrariums: Another way to enjoy another world without leaving home is to craft a terrarium. While specially built glasshouses are available, you can use any container that will function as a tiny greenhouse. A terrarium will allow you to grow plants for tropical locales that require high humidity and are often designed as tiny ecosystems, with many types of plants forming a little slice of the jungle. A terrarium is also a great place to grow carnivorous plants like Venus Flytraps, since their natural habitat of humid bogs is hard to come by in Colorado! Like bonsai from temperate climates, Flytraps require a (mild) winter to thrive over years; consider putting them in a cold room, near a drafty window, or outdoors in early spring (when temperatures are above freezing but still cool) to mimic their natural growing conditions. Tropical plants need no such pampering.

Fairy Gardens: Just about any small garden furnished with the appropriate props can be dubbed a "fairy garden." Most traditionally, fairy gardens, like bonsai, use plants that can give the appearance of great age and distant scale with small leaves and trainable



habits, allowing a gardener to create a pint-sized homestead. Hedges, topiary, and trees adorned with treehouses are common sights in the fairy garden. Owing to the extra imagination involved, fairy gardens can be a great project to complete with kids. To keep things from becoming completely zany, consider choosing a theme to help guide plant and prop choices—why not build a leprechaun manor this St. Patrick's Day?

Whatever type of miniature garden you decide to try, remember that the number one cause of plant death indoors in over-watering. Water your plants thoroughly, but then allow the container to dry slightly before watering again (how much precisely to let things dry depends on the plant you're growing). A closed terrarium may require water once or twice a month, while a bonsai may need daily attention. Other considerations include light, temperature, and nutrients (in the form of fertilizer). Choose the right plants for your indoor environment, and then let the armchair adventuring begin!

No Parking in the Townhouse Alleyways

The townhouse alleyways are not for parking. Please do not park any vehicle or have any contractor park their vehicle in the alleyways at any time. The only exception is for short term loading and unloading.



Willow Creek Pets

Dogs must be leashed when they are out and about in our community. Both the city and our HOA require it. City of Centennial Animal Control patrols Willow Creek and will issue warnings and tickets to offenders. There have been serious incidents in the past where unleashed dogs have injured other pets and/or caused residents to be concerned for their safety.

Don't forget to clean up after your pet when dog walking. The city of Centennial (municipal code 7-7-320) as well as Willow Creek 3 policies, require that pet owners remove and dispose of pet waste on any property other than that of the owner or keeper. In other words, when you are out and about with your dog, don't leave a mess. City fines start at \$50 and can include a Municipal Court appearance. And if you see someone not following the rules, please let them know. Also, both Willow Creek 3 and the city require that dogs be leashed and under control when out in the community.

Did you know?

- 1. Stormwater carries pet waste and other pollutants directly into waterways.
- 2. Animal waste adds nitrogen to the water. Excess nitrogen depletes the oxygen in water necessary for beneficial underwater grasses, wildlife and fish.
- 3. Animal waste may contain harmful organisms such as Giardia, Salmonella and E. coli that can be transmitted to humans and other animals by ingesting contaminated water.
- 4. Roundworms and hookworms deposited by infected animals can live in the soil for long periods of time and be transmitted to other animals and humans.




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
